LIBRARY RULES

- No student shall leave or enter the classroom without the permission of the teacher.
- No student snall leave or enter the classroom without the permission of the teacher.

- Any disfigurement or damage to college building, water, gas, fire, electrical installations, gardens and premises will be punished and the cost of the damages if any will be recovered.
- Students are forbidden to organize or attend any meeting in the college or to collect money for any purpose without the prior permission of the Principal.
 Students will be expelled from the college for breach of discipline by the Principal in

consultation with the College Council and there shall be no appeal to the decision taken

by the College Council.

- 16. Outsiders are not allowed inside the campus without permission.17. Students should not crowd in the verandas or sit on the side walls of the corridors
